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Introduction

Under Ontario Police Services Act (January 1, 2019) municipalities were required to develop and adopt community safety and well-being plans working in partnership with an advisory committee, including local service providers. *As stated in the Community Safety and Well-being Planning Framework – A Shared Commitment in Ontario*, “The goal of this type of community safety and well-being planning is to achieve sustainable communities where everyone is safe, has a sense of belonging, opportunities to participate, and where individuals and families are able to meet their needs for education, health care, food, housing, income and social and cultural expression. The success of society is linked to the well-being of each and every individual.”

A framework was provided through which concerns could be reviewed:

- Incident Response – critical and non-critical incident response
- Risk Intervention – mitigating situations of elevated risk
- Prevention – proactively reducing identified risks
- Social Development – promoting and maintaining community safety and well-being

Municipal staff, and representatives of the various organizations providing services to the area began to meet in January 2020. It was obvious from the outset that many of the service providers for Dubreuilville were also service providers for White River and Wawa, most based in Wawa. It was also apparent that there are many committees/tables/organizations working to improve services in the area in a collaborative manner. A decision was made to hold the initial meetings with all three communities and once local concerns were being identified and goals were being established the groups would meet separately for each community. Each community would have a separate plan developed based upon their own needs.

The COVID-19 pandemic caused a delay in the work whilst committee members worked at developing new ways of working and meeting. Meetings began again in earnest in January 2021. A public review of the draft plan was held in each community prior to the officially accepting the plan.

It has been an interesting exercise in working with three communities in North Algoma – Dubreuilville, White River and Wawa. A decision was made early on to hold meetings with representatives of all three communities at the outset. This allowed the service providers the opportunity to go to one meeting instead of three. As work progressed the communities began to meet with the providers separately to develop their goals and actions.

Each community has its own characteristics, strengths and areas of concern. What is noted is that they all have individuals who are committed to making their communities strong and safe. It is recognized that each community, although a separate entity, is connected to the others by a network of services – providing service as best they can with, often times, limited resources. The COVID-19 pandemic highlighted the difficulties in servicing three communities, many kilometres apart, with limited resources and no clear plan in place as to how to continue to provide great care. It is my hope that all three communities will have a workable plan that will benefit their community, without compromising the safety and well-being of the other communities. We must share our resources and should work together to increase these resources, rather than taking from one to give to the other.

The plans are ‘living’ plans and can be reviewed and revised when necessary. Some of the goals are not going to be achieved overnight – these are why ‘working groups’ are being established – to look at complex issues that will require complex solutions.

Community Snap Shot

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Dubreuilville is a small, northern, Francophone community located approximately 30 kilometres off Highway 17, between Wawa and White River. Their concerns are a reflection of the concerns throughout Ontario, albeit on a smaller scale – mental health and addictions and the services available; housing for all family sizes and income levels; and policing. Working with service providers, and the municipality taking the lead, a plan was developed.

Dubreuilville has a population of 613 people (2016 Census) with an increase in temporary population due to the development of mines and construction in the area. More than half of the stable population is over the age of 20 and most of these people are working. Children attend elementary school in Dubreuilville but are bussed to Wawa for secondary school. They are able to access services in Wawa during school hours. Industry in the area includes Alamos Gold Mine inc. – Island Gold and Argonaut Gold – Magino Project in the early stages of construction. An influx of workers for the construction and operation of the mines has resulted in a number of bunkhouses being located in and around the community.

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Safety and Well-Being Plan

Incident Response – critical and non-critical response

Police, ambulance and fire response is available in the community. A nurse practitioner led clinic is available on weekdays. CHADWIC Home and Wawa and Area Victim Services are available (located in Wawa) to provide emergency services either virtually or in person as necessary. Other health/social services are available in the community on an intermittent (usually weekly) basis. A complete list of services with descriptions can be found in the Appendix: Asset Mapping

Policing

The Superior East Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police is located on the east shore of Lake Superior and includes areas in the District of Algoma and District of Sudbury. The geographical area of Superior East Detachment consists of approximately 50,000 square kilometres. The administrative office (Host) is located on Highway 17 in the community of Wawa. Satellite offices include White River, Hornepayne, Chapleau, Wawa Municipal and the newly acquired Foleyet Detachment (as of October 2020). The Superior East Detachment is responsible for policing the above communities, along with Dubreuilville, Hawk Junction and Missinabie. The Superior East Detachment is also responsible for policing two First Nations communities. The remaining communities are policed by Nishnawbe-Aski Police Service (NAPS). The Trans-Canada Highway is the core that connects all of our communities and is vital to all of its industries, making traffic safety a priority in Superior East. The current compliment of officers assigned to the Superior East cluster is 40 Constables, 8 Sergeants and 1 Staff Sergeant (Detachment Commander). Of the 40 constables, 2 are assigned to Court Services, 2 are assigned to the Crime unit (Detective Constables) and 1 is assigned as the Community Safety Officer. All four detachments of the Superior East cluster are duration postings and staffing vacancies are an ongoing challenge.

Ontario passed the Comprehensive Ontario Police Services Act, 2019 (Bill 68) and established the Community Safety and Policing Act, 2019 (CSPA) which, once in force, will repeal the Police Services Act, 1990 (PSA). Section 67 of the CSPA requires there be an Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) detachment board, or more than one OPP detachment board, for each detachment of the OPP that provides policing in a municipality or in a First Nation community. The Ministry is required to develop a regulation related to the composition of each OPP detachment board. To achieve this, the ministry has developed an “OPP Detachment Board Framework”.

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Policing

The new OPP Detachment Board Framework will provide civilian governance to 326 municipalities and 43 First Nations including those that:

- Are directly policed by the OPP;
- Employ their own First Nations Constables but receive administrative support from the OPP; and
- Receive “OPP Dedicated” policing (i.e. North Caribou Lake and Wapekeka First Nation).

By enhancing civilian governance, the OPP Detachment Board Framework under the CSPA will:

- Ensure each municipality and First Nation receiving OPP services and supports has an opportunity to represent their local perspectives, needs, and priorities; and
- Provide opportunities for municipalities and First Nations to collaborate on efforts to improve community safety.

The Corporation of the Township of Dubreuilville will ensure that at least one representative is named to the SE OPP Detachment Board.

Fire Response

The community of Dubreuilville is served by a volunteer fire department which is common in small, rural communities. They are available to assist with not only fire but other emergency situations.

Ambulance Response

The community of Dubreuilville is served by the Algoma District Services Administrative Board Paramedic Service. An ambulance is available (on-site) 12 hours each day and 12-hours standby. Patients are generally transported to Wawa for emergency care.

Health Clinic

Dubreuilville is serviced locally by a Nurse Practitioner Led Clinic, operated by the Lady Dunn Health Centre. With ties to the Wawa Family Health Team and the Lady Dunn Health Centre residents can receive a full range of primary care services. As with other small, rural communities, residents will have to go to larger centres for specialized care, including obstetrics and oncology.

CSWB Plan

Mental Health, Addiction and General Health Services

Dubreuilville is serviced by organizations based in Wawa and/or Sault Ste. Marie with offices in Wawa. A Mental Health and Addictions Table has been working to identify the services available in the area and determine what services need to be enhanced. It is strongly felt that managing and planning of services needs to take place at a local level.

All communities are struggling with recruiting and retaining medical personnel, including physicians, nurses, lab technicians and mental health professionals (social workers, counsellors). In spite of that, there are some services available, but it isn't clear that residents are aware of the services or how to access them. This has become more readily apparent when services began to be offered virtually rather than in person. There are some concerns that people may not want to use a phone line that is connecting them to someone far away. In addition, it is important that service be available in French, if possible.

The concerns with mental health and addiction are difficult and will require collaboration between people from the various organizations and communities (CMHA; AFS; NAC; WFHT, LDHC).

A listing of services available and contact information will be provided to the township who will disseminate the information to the community. This listing will include information provided by CMHA, including their referral line.

The Corporation of the Township of Dubreuilville will ensure that all disseminated materials are translated into French.

In an effort to increase the number of medical and allied health professionals in the area, the communities of Dubreuilville, White River and Wawa, have joined forces with area organizations/industry to employ a multi pronged strategy towards recruitment and retention.

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Prevention – proactively reducing identified risks

Housing

Dubreuilville is experiencing a growth in population due to mining activity in the area. A number of bunkhouses have been established. There is little to no residential building occurring. The community would prefer that families move to the community, but without any turn-key homes available it is difficult to attract them.

The issues with insufficient housing are complex and require more thought than a wellbeing plan can provide.

The township will establish a working group to determine the housing needs and the best way for fulfilling these needs. This will be led by N1 Strategy – Economic Development Consulting Firm. It is expected that ADSAB and reps from the municipality and industry and business will be involved.







Dwelling Types




Education Levels
